Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) states and the entire United States have increasingly diverse populations, and college enrollments are starting to reflect this trend. More than one-fourth of U.S. college students are people of color. Unfortunately, the nation's diversity is not reflected in higher education faculties. At predominantly white colleges and universities, only about one in 30 faculty members is a person of color. The numbers are only slightly better at predominantly minority-serving institutions.

The SREB-State Doctoral Scholars Program was established 1993 to address the shortage of minority faculty members and increase their numbers in the 16-state SREB region. The program continues today as a partnership of SREB states, other

regional education organizations, and federal and philanthropic programs working to strengthen graduate education for racial/ ethnic minority students and guide talented persons into college and university teaching. The program is one of the nation's most successful models for producing competitive, highly qualified minority Ph.D. graduates who pursue careers as college and university faculty members. It provides multiple layers of support, including financial resources (for students who are admit-

ted to programs on their own merits), professional development, mentoring and networking to Ph.D. students. The program also is the lead host of the nation's largest annual gathering of minority doctoral students and faculty mentors, the Compact for Faculty Diversity Institute on Teaching and Mentoring.

# Minority Faculty Numbers Rising, But Not Overall Percentages

While the number of racial/ethnic minority faculty members has risen steadily over the past 25 years, the proportion of minority faculty members has not risen substantially nationwide.

From 1995 to 2005, the number of racial/ethnic minority faculty members increased by 60 percent, from about 70,000 to about 110,000. But with the overall rise in the number of college faculty members and enrollments, the representation of minority faculty remains low.

The percentage of minority faculty members rose from 6 percent to 8.9 percent from 1995 to 2005. The percentage of full-time African-American faculty members rose only slightly from 1980 to 2004, from 4.3 percent to 5.3 percent. Hispanic percentages rose from 1.5 percent to 3.1 percent during the same period. American Indians as faculty members moved from 0.2 percent to 0.5 percent nationally.

#### The SREB-State Doctoral Scholars Program:

Still, about half of all minority faculty members work at predominantly minority-serving institutions, which means many colleges and students do not benefit from the talents, skills, interests and perspectives of minority faculty members.

Another issue facing faculty diversity is the disproportionate distribution of minority faculty members in certain fields of study. Most doctorate degrees among African-Americans nationally are in the field of education. Forty percent in 2005, in fact, were in education, 18 percent in the social sciences and psychology, 16 percent in the life sciences and 10 percent in the humanities. Only 5 percent of doctoral degrees earned by African-Americans were in the physical sciences, 5 percent in engineering, 3 percent in business, 1 percent in communications, and 3 percent in other fields of study.




# SREB Mark Musick Scholar Graduates Celebrate Their Milestone Accomplishments

#### Additional Facts About the SREB-State Doctoral Scholars Program

- Many Ph.D. graduates served by the program now teach at the college or university level. Seventy-nine percent are employed in education, 97 percent as campus faculty members, administrators and postdoctoral researchers; and 71 percent are employed in the 16 SREB states.
- Scholars entering the program with a bachelor's degree graduate in 4.6 years on average.
   Scholars entering with a master's degree graduate on average in 3.3 years.
- More than one-third of the program's scholars (36 percent) study science, technology, engineering and mathematics; 21 percent are in the social and behavioral sciences; and 43 percent are in other fields.



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
