We've completed another successful Compact for Faculty Diversity Annual Institute on Teaching and Mentoring. The Compact is a combination of three interstate compacts - the New England Board of Higher Education (NEBHE), the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB), and the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education (WICHE). This year's Institute was in Atlanta and was our largest and best yet. There were faculty, scholars, guests, state representatives and leaders from almost every state on hand for the four day event.

This year's Institute welcomed participants from all over the United States from each region of the compact as well as special groups. Some of the groups in attendance this year included: Alliance for Graduate Education and the Professoriate (AGEP), Alfred. P. >> The Scholar Zone - Online Support Discussion Board

The scholar support discussion board is an interactive bulletin board where scholars and graduates can come for advice, networking and professional communications with other doctoral scholars. The discussion board will include the following forum topics: tips and advice for first-year, middle-year and all-but-dissertation (ABD) scholars; tips and advice for the dissertation-writing years; advice on career development; and advice on personal and family life during graduate school.

DOCTORAL SCHOLARS PROGRAM PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT



The SREB-State Doctoral Scholars Program has set aside a special fund to encourage research activities and further scholars' professional development as doctoral candidates. Early practice in standing before professional peers to describe and articulate investigations in an academic discipline contributes to the scholar's skills and abilities as a future college faculty member. All actively funded SREB-State Doctoral Scholars program participants are eligible to submit a request for funds.

A request <u>must</u> be submitted at least 30 days prior to the event at which you will present. We cannot issue professional development funds if this is not done in advance. We also cannot pre-approve any request without written documentation of your participation in the event.

Once you have been pre-approved for professional development funding, you must then follow-up within 30 days with a completed form and original receipts. Failure to do so will result in non-payment of your expenses. Professional development funds are distributed once per month.
