From the President and the Director

One-third of the nation's college students are people of color, but only about one in 10 college and university faculty members in SREB states is a minority. Even more unacceptable, on predominantly white campuses, minority faculty represent less than one in 30. The numbers are even worse in the fields of science, technology, engineering and mathematics.

The SREB-State Doctoral Scholars Program was created in 1993 to address this long-standing national shortage of minority faculty in the United States. The program has significantly increased the number of minority scholars who earn Ph.D.s and seek careers as faculty members at colleges and universities.

With continued support from states, colleges, universities and scholars, we have reached our 300th Mark Musick Doctoral Scholar graduate in just 13 years. Our graduates are employed in academic settings in 36 states, and 10 graduates already have achieved tenure.

The SREB-State Doctoral Scholars Program takes pride in being “more than a check and a handshake.” The program provides multiple layers of support, encouragement and preparation designed to help scholars earn their doctoral degrees and proceed along the path to the professoriate. In addition to financial support, scholars learn the mechanics of conducting research, effective mentoring, writing proposals, the latest teaching techniques and networking.
