The Issue

Minority students attain graduate degrees and enter academia at far lower rates than majority-group students. This means the contributions by people of color in academia and the professoriate are limited. This issue also has serious implications for all students whose educational experiences are enriched by diversity and for whom faculty members serve as influential mentors and role models.

The Institute on Teaching and Mentoring

The Institute on Teaching and Mentoring addresses the minority faculty shortage by providing racial/ethnic minority students with information, encouragement and support to pursue doctoral degrees and become college professors. The Institute focuses on increasing the percentage of minority students who earn doctorates and helps diversify the pool of qualified candidates for faculty positions at colleges and universities. The Institute enables doctoral candidates to share insights and survival tips for success in graduate work, build community among themselves and faculty representatives, and enrich their research and teaching strategies. The Institute also benefits faculty members by helping them hone the mentoring skills that can assist them to create supportive departmental environments for underrepresented students.





Atrium Level (AL)




Meeting Room Maps





Plenary Speakers

Robert Belle



Dr. Robert (Bob) Belle was destined to be an educator. As the son and nephew of elementary teachers, Dr. Belle's career has included teaching experiences from elementary through graduate levels of education. Throughout his distinguished career, Dr. Belle has advocated for minority and underserved student access to opportunities in higher education. His numerous directorship positions include Upward Bound, Dropout Prevention, and Affirmative Action programs as well as the Office of Federal TRIO Programs and the Office of Minority Student Services. He has served as Tenured Associate Professor, Assistant Dean of Academic Affairs and Acting Assistant Deputy Secretary of Education. A founding Associate Director of the SREB-State Doctoral Scholars Program, he continues to serve as Senior Consultant. Of his many awards, Dr. Belle is most proud of being an original inductee into the Glassboro Athletic Hall of Fame in 1986, his 2001 Frank Abbott Award for contributions to the Institute, his 2013 Walter O. Mason Jr. Award for contributions to TRIO, and his Rowan University Lifetime Service Award in 2016.

Kamau Bobb



Dr. Kamau Bobb is the Global Lead for Diversity Strategy and Research at Google and the founding Senior Director of the Constellations Center for Equity in Computing at Georgia Tech. He is an engineer and science and technology policy scholar whose work focuses on the relationship between equity for students and communities of color in the STEM enterprise, large educational systems, and the social and structural conditions that influence contemporary American life. His wealth of experience includes former Program Officer at the National Science Foundation (NSF), where he helped shape the national research agenda for effective means of delivering equitable and quality computational education to all students. He has worked with members of the Office of Science and Technology Policy in the Obama Administration to set the national strategy for STEM education and was selected as a member of President Obama's My Brother's Keeper STEM + Entrepreneurship Taskforce to help U.S. cities craft strategies to engage young men and boys of color in the STEM landscape. Dr. Bobb holds a Ph.D. in Science and Technology Policy from Georgia Tech and M.S. and B.S. degrees in Mechanical Engineering from the University of California, Berkeley.



Thelma Garcia

Dr. Thelma Garcia is the Newman Laboratory Research and Administrative Manager at the Buck Institute for Research on Aging in California. Her current research project involves maintaining a comprehensive research database of ketone body science. Her diverse range of publications includes topics in Stem Cell, CRISPR, Gold and Chromium. Besides serving as a hands-on Research Project Manager and assisting scientists while promoting multi-background awareness and effective crosscultural and multidisciplinary communication in the lab, Dr. Garcia really enjoys being a mentor. She volunteers for the UC Davis FUTURE Career program, Sonoma County MESA Industry Alliance, and the MESA and STEM programs, as well as the Sonoma County Career Technical Education Foundation where she mentors High School Science Teachers. Dr. Garcia attended Santa Rosa Junior College, Sonoma State University and, later, UC Davis, where she completed doctoral studies in Chemistry. As a CDC-APHL postdoctoral fellow, Dr. Garcia's focus was in biochemistry/toxicology.

Julio Hernandez



Julio Hernandez serves as the Chief of Staff for the Division for Inclusion & Equity at Clemson University, where he provides analysis, recommendations and options to the Chief Diversity Officer on decisions to be made or problems to be resolved. Hernandez also provides leadership and support to the Vice Presidents and Associate Vice Presidents on inclusion and equity in recruiting, retaining and advancing Hispanic/Latinx students, staff and faculty, while fostering for them a welcoming, inclusive environment. In addition, Hernandez serves as the co-chair for Clemson University's Men of Color Summit, Brother-to-Brother Advisory Board, Global Leadership Institute Advisory Board, Clemson University Council for Diversity & Inclusion, President's Commission for Latino Affairs, and Staff Senator for both the President's and Board of Trustees budget center. Hernandez is a first-generation high school and college graduate with a bachelor's degree in International Business from the University of the Incarnate Word in San Antonio, Texas, and a master's degree in Management & Leadership from Webster University in Greenville. He is currently pursuing his doctorate in Educational Leadership with a focus in higher education.

Antentor Othrell Hinton Jr.



Dr. Antentor Othrell Hinton Jr. is a Ford Foundation and Burroughs Wellcome Fund Postdoctoral Fellow at the University of Iowa, where he works in the laboratory of Dr. E. Dale Abel, the Chair and Departmental Executive Officer of Internal Medicine. He has been a passionate mentor for undergraduate students and has supported the careers of many undergraduates in Dr. Abel's laboratory. He has mentored 37 graduate and undergraduate students and has won two university-wide mentorship awards. In 2016, Dr. Hinton graduated from the Integrative Molecular and Biomedical Sciences Ph.D. Program at Baylor College of Medicine (BCM). Notably, he published two first author and 12 co-author publications during his time in Dr. Yong Xu's laboratory. He has won 26 career development, travel award, research award, oral and poster awards, and graduate fellowship awards. Before earning his doctorate, Dr. Hinton graduated from the Post Baccalaureate Research Education Program at BCM in 2010. He earned his bachelor's degree in biology at Winston-Salem State University.

Shirley Malcom



Dr. Shirley Malcom is Senior Advisor and Director of SEA Change at the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS). She has served as head of the AAAS Office of Opportunities in Science and as program officer in the Science Education Directorate of the National Science Foundation (NSF). Dr. Malcom received her doctorate in ecology from The Pennsylvania State University; her master's degree in zoology from the University of California, Los Angeles; and her bachelor's degree with distinction in zoology from the University of Washington. In addition, she holds seventeen honorary degrees. She serves on several boards, including The Heinz Endowments, and is an honorary trustee of the American Museum of Natural History, a Regent of Morgan State University, and a trustee of Caltech. She chairs the board of the National Math-Science Initiative and co-chairs the Gender Advisory Board of the UN Commission on Science and Technology for Development. In 2003, Dr. Malcom received the Public Welfare Medal of the National Academy of Sciences, the highest award given by the Academy.

Stephen Pruitt



Dr. Stephen Pruitt started his education career as a high school chemistry teacher in Fayetteville and Tyrone, Georgia. During his career, He has amassed an extensive policy, assessment and instructional background in education at the local, state and national levels. A native of Georgia, Dr. Pruitt holds a bachelor's degree in chemistry from North Georgia College and State University, a master's degree in science education from the University of West Georgia and a Ph.D. in chemistry education from Auburn University.

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
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
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
