Overview

- Legislatively created in 2004.
- Distinct from GaDOE.
- Commissioner appointed by the Governor. Currently five Deputy Commissioners, three "chiefs", and the DECAL Foundation and Head Start Collaboration Office.
- Over 800 staff and a 1.2 billion dollar budget
- Pros:
 - Shared Resources
 - Ability to address distinct Early Education Needs
- Cons:
 - Sometimes, though not as much, not seen as "education"
 - Many providers have many interactions with DECAL.

- Georgia's Pre-K Program
- Child Care Licensing
- Childcare and Parent Services (CAPS), Georgia's subsidy program
- Quality Rated, Georgia's quality rating and improvement system
- Nutrition Services
- Head Start State Collaboration Office
- Initiatives related to 2Gen, Community Resources, Inclusion and Behavior Supports, Infants and Toddlers, Infant Early Childhood Mental Health (IECMH), Workforce Development and Professional Learning, Research


















Commonly Asked Data Points

- 4,275 licensed child care providers
 - 3,209 Child Care Learning Centers
 - 1,066 Family Child Care Learning Homes
- 53,000 children are currently using a CAPS scholarship.
- 3,867 Georgia's Pre-K classrooms at 1,888 sites serving 70,572 children
- 58,135,916 meals served in CACFP and 2,930,244 in Happy Helpings (SFSP) in FFY 2024

Pre-K Summer Transition Program (STP)

- Targeted five-week school readiness program
- Rising Kindergarten Program
 - Focuses on children who did not attend Georgia's Pre-K or attended but need additional support and who will attend Kindergarten in the fall




- Rising Pre-K Program
 - Focuses on children whose home language is Spanish and who will attend Pre-K in the fall

CHILD-FOCUSED WITH PARENT & CAREGIVER ELEMENTS

This could include early childhood development with parenting skills; family literacy with health screenings; and/or other child-focused services that also identify ways to support the adults in their lives.



WHOLE FAMILY

Two-generation (2Gen) approaches build family well-being by intentionally and simultaneously working with children and the adults in their lives together.



This could include workforce programs offering child care referrals; food and nutrition supports for student parents: and/or other adult-focused services that also identify ways to support their role as parents or caregivers.




Georgia's Population: Birth Through Age 5

Georgia's birth through 5 population has declined by 1.6% since 2020. This is the primary source of demand for the ECE industry.




Georgia's Population Served by Licensed or Regulated ECE Industry (2024)

Enrollment in early care and education varies dramatically across age groups, increasing with age from birth through age 4.






Total Annual Economic Impact of the ECE Industry in Georgia (2014–2024)





Types of Economic Impact




Economic impact is measured through three types of effects:


- 1. Direct Effects: The money spent on a product/service.
- 2. Indirect Effects: Business to business spending within the supply chain.
- 3. Induced Effects:
 Employees' household spending due to their earned income.

Importance of High-Quality Early Education



90% of brain development takes place from birth to age five

Early education is associated with improved academic achievement, cognitive development, self-regulation skills, and social-emotional development

All children benefit from high-quality preschool, but especially children from low-income families and dual language learners

> Children who enter kindergarten ready to succeed are more likely to read on grade level by third grade, graduate from high school, go to college, and be productive members of the workforce
